Equine gastric ulcers are common and they have a wide variety of clinical signs; however, the only way to diagnose them is via gastroscopy. This involves starving your horse 12 hours before the procedure to ensure their stomach is empty. Then we sedate them to pass the camera (called a gastroscope) into their stomach to assess its lining and look for ulcers.

## Worm egg count reminder

Many of you have already sent in your samples for this time of year but here's a reminder to anyone yet to send them. We will send our next reminders out in October.

As a practice we recommend following a strategic worm control plan (worming your horse based on the results of faecal worm egg counts), as it reduces the further development of drug resistant worms, as well as being the most cost-effective approach.



## **Strangles**

Strangles is a hot topic and can cause lots of discussion among the equine community due to its nature and as the infection is easily spread.

Strangles is a highly contagious, bacterial, respiratory infection caused by Streptococcus equi equi. It can affect horses, ponies and donkeys of all ages. Clinical signs can include pyrexia (high temperature), nasal discharge, enlarged lymph nodes, inappetence, lethargy and coughing. The bacteria are shed in nasal discharge or in pus draining from open abscesses.



The disease can be spread by direct contact between horses or indirect contact, on equipment or personnel. It can take between 3–14 days from a horse being infected by the bacteria to presenting with clinical signs.

Diagnosis is usually based upon results of a nasopharyngeal swab or endoscopy within the guttural pouches. However, diagnosis is not always straightforward. A blood test can be used as part of an outbreak management plan. Any horse suspected of having strangles should be isolated from others until results of diagnostic testing can be asecertained.

Treatment is usually symptomatic nursing care, but will be tailored to individual case requirements. Most horses will recover and stop shedding the bacteria after approximately 6 weeks; however, some horses (roughly 10%) will go on to become carriers, meaning they are persistently infected and can continue to spread disease without showing any outward clinical signs. Your vet can help by creating a management plan for an outbreak and post outbreak to ensure all horses are safe.

### StrangVac

A new strangles vaccine has been produced by Dechra. It is a novel vaccine which provides a broad immune response and protects against all variants of S.equi. The vaccine will lessen the clinical signs of strangles in the early stages of disease, which means that the likelihood of your horse being unwell is significantly reduced.

The vaccine is administered via intramuscular injection, the same as for Tetanus and Equine Influenza. The primary vaccination course is two vaccines administered four weeks apart. It is recommended that horses receive regular booster vaccinations following the primary course to maintain protection against strangles.
