



Heat Stress in Pigs

The summer months are now upon us and once again we are experiencing very warm temperatures. Both Sows and Growing pigs are at risk of heat stress, indoors and outdoors, so it is important to know how you can help. Identifying acute cases as well as how to prevent heat stress are both important factors to consider. I would hope most are aware that pigs cannot sweat, the mechanism that we use to cool. We therefore have a responsibility to provide pigs with the resources they require to cool themselves. We can help in two ways: Directly assisting with cooling; Dissipating the heat from surroundings. See below for ideas.

- Direct assistance with cooling
 - Outdoor pigs Wallows / running water source.
 - Indoor pigs Bucketing water directly onto sows in farrowing house / Dampening Straw / Misting pigs /cleaning scrape ways regularly to allow passageways to be flooded for wallowing.
- Dissipating the Heat
 - Outdoor Pigs Painting Huts with White Paint / Creating shaded areas to reduce direct sunlight exposure.
 - Indoor Pigs Clearing out deep bedded systems regularly / Reduce direct sunlight exposure.



Heat stress could present in many ways, but some of the main clinical signs are as follows: Lethargy, Panting/Open Mouth Breathing, Recumbency (plus or minus neurological signs), Milk drop, Fertility issues and in the severe cases mortality.

Don't forget it's not just the pigs in the heat, other things to check are semen and medicines storage!
